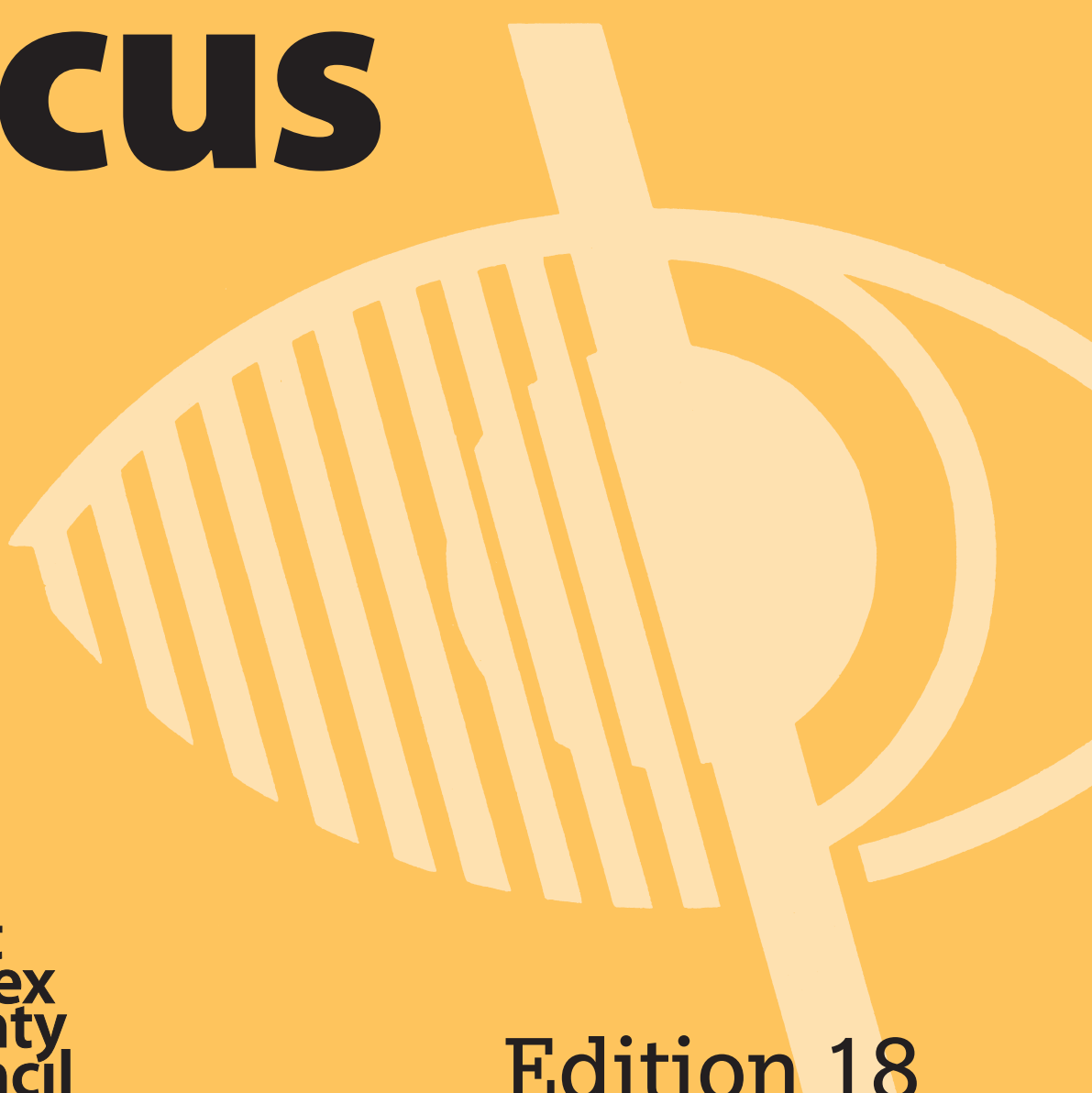

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Introduction

If your vision is deteriorating, you may be experiencing practical and emotional difficulties which may also have an impact on your family, friends and carers.

We have compiled this booklet so that people, who need help and advice on sight loss, can find information about services and organisations.

Sight loss and registration

Anyone experiencing difficulties with their sight is advised to go to their doctor who may refer them to an optician or an ophthalmologist at the local eye clinic. The ophthalmologist is a specialist who can identify eye conditions and may recommend treatments. They may decide that the degree of sight loss makes the person eligible for registration as Sight Impaired or Severely Sight Impaired.

Referral to a Vision Rehabilitation Specialist

There are various ways of being referred to a VRS.

- **Opticians.** If an optician finds that you are having significant difficulties with your eyesight, they may give you a Low Vision Leaflet (LVL). You can fill in the form and send it to our Adults' CarePoint. See contact details on page 2.
- **Eye clinics.** If an eye clinic identifies that you have significant difficulties with your sight, they will, with your permission, complete a 'Referral of Vision Impaired Patients' (RVI).
- **Consultant ophthalmologist.** If an ophthalmologist gives you a Certificate of Visual Impairment, West Sussex County Council (WSCC) will contact you to discuss registration.
- **Self-referral.** If you are having significant difficulties with your sight, you or someone else can contact Adults' CarePoint. See page 2 for contact details.

What is registration?

There are two categories of registration.

1. Sight Impaired (SI/partially sighted).
2. Severely Sight Impaired (SSI/blind).

Being registered does not necessarily mean that your sight will deteriorate. Registration is not compulsory, but it may help you to access certain benefits and support. Many services are available without being registered.

The process of registration

The ophthalmologist will complete a Certificate of Visual Impairment (CVI) and send it to us at WSCC.

When we receive the CVI, an Assessment Officer will contact you and tell you about the services that are available. You will be offered an assessment of your needs to discuss your situation and possible solutions.

If you choose to be registered, you will be issued with a registration card and listed on the West Sussex register of Visual Impairment.

Charles Bonnet Syndrome

This term describes the visual hallucinations which may happen when vision is deteriorating. Visions can range from patterns, shapes flowers, trees, animals and people to entire scenes. The hallucinations are quite common amongst people who are experiencing sight loss. There is no cure, but visions often diminish and stop within a year or 18 months.

If you are having problems with the visions, it may be useful to contact your GP about other help which may be available.

Visual impairment services

We have Vision Rehabilitation Specialists, who have been trained to help visually impaired children and adults. They will discuss your needs with regard to your sight loss and advise you about new ways of coping with any aspect of daily living. For example, they can demonstrate ways of cooking safely and moving about independently, both indoors and out. Their training helps them to understand that you may be feeling frustrated and apprehensive about living with low vision. They can also give you details about the services mentioned in this book.

Deaf and hard of hearing people

We have specialist workers who can help Deaf or hard of hearing people. They work with adults, children, and people who may have additional needs.

If you meet our eligibility criteria you will be offered an

assessment by a member of our Deaf Services Team to find out what support you need.

Members of Deaf Services can also provide advice and information on a range of support services available including:

People who are registered SSI and pay income tax can claim Blind Person's Allowance. If they do not use all of their allowance, they may be able to transfer this to a spouse or civil partner. Contact HMRC to organise this.

If your property has been adapted to assist you with your disability, or if you have had to set aside a room to house your specialist equipment, you may be eligible for the Disability Reduction Scheme. Contact your local district or borough council to see if you qualify.

Daily living

Reading

Using your vision will not cause further deterioration, but it is important to wear any spectacles which have been prescribed for you. To make the best use of your vision, it is usually helpful to have plenty of light illuminating the reading material.

You are advised to visit an optician once a year for an eye health check, even if you have been told that spectacles will not help you.

Low vision aids (magnifiers)

These are designed to help you make the best use of your remaining vision. The following can carry out an assessment.

Children

West Sussex Children's Services Sensory Support Team

The HABs (Habilitation and Mobility Officers) in this team can give specialist advice, information and support to you and your child with a vision impairment. They are able to provide training for mobility and life skills to maximise your child's development and independence, both at school and at home. They can also provide environmental audits in educational settings and advise on any adjustments that are required. They liaise closely with Advisory Qualified Teachers for Vision Impairment, the school and other agencies as appropriate.

All schools in West Sussex have a responsibility to assess children with disabilities. They provide support to children to help them participate in learning and to play a full part in the life of the school.

Advisory Qualified Teachers for Vision Impairment from the Sensory Support Team can provide support and advice to families, early years settings and West Sussex maintained schools.

In some cases, the County Council may decide to put an Education, Health and Care Plan in place, outlining your child's special educational needs and how these will be met in school.

Driving

Information for driving licence holders

You must be able to read a post September 2001) car number plate at 20 metres (65 feet).

The law requires you to tell the DVLA (Driver and Vehicle Licensing Agency) immediately about any condition that may affect your ability to drive safely. Therefore, if your sight is affecting your driving, or a specialist has advised that you are not safe, you must contact:

Registration as SI or SSI is normally regarded as incompatible with holding a driving licence. You are breaking the law if you are driving without meeting the vision requirements and you are liable to a substantial fine. If you are involved in an accident and it is found that your health condition was a contributing factor you may be prosecuted, and your

insurance may not be valid.

Class 3 Pavement Vehicles

This category includes powered wheelchairs and other outdoor powered vehicles, including scooters for use on roads and highways with a maximum speed limit of 8mph, and facility to travel at 4mph on footways.

These vehicles need to be registered with DVLA and display a 'nil duty' tax disc. Your local DVLA office can be contacted by phoning 0300 7906802.

Although there is no legal sight requirement you should be able to read a car number plate from 12.3 metres (40 ft).

You are advised to take out insurance if you are driving one of these vehicles, and to advise your insurance company about your visual impairment.
